Message from the Reunion Chair: Linda M. King, Vice President

The Claiborne Society held their 19th reunion in Richmond, Virginia on September 26 through September 28, 2024. Richmond is a city where we reunite at least every second or third reunion. The theme was Claiborne Connections, celebrating how we all connect to one another.

Thursday, September 26th

Claibornes began arriving Thursday afternoon at the Omni Richmond Hotel. Registration was held on the Westham Porch of the hotel. Here they received nametags with a mini copy of the schedule and gift bag with a reunion folder with a matching sticker beautiful crafted by Jennene Norman-Vacha (a Claiborne friend), containing the program, a list of local restaurants, a book of available attractions, a copy of the summer letter from Secretary, Nicholas Cline, a Welcome introduction letter with the schedule, including last minute room changes for our meetings, a copy of Richmond: A Historical Perspective, by native Susan Williams Harrold Rura, a copy from the Friends of Hollywood newsletter about the grave of Thomas Claybourne, a list of the burial locations of the first five generations of Claibornes (courtesv of Patricia Clavborn), the Claiborne Reunion Praver, and a copy of the Claiborne Society Bylaws. Included in the bag were refreshing teas, a notepad, and some local Virginia peanuts.

Linda began collecting sign-up information for those who were attending Sweet Hall on Saturday as carpooling would need to take place due to the remote location of the home. Final arrangements for rides would be made Saturday morning at breakfast.

Guests enjoyed visiting with one another while they could purchase drinks, view Claiborne-related books and displays, enjoy an appetizer and pick up current Society directories prepared by Frank Rura.

A large group went to The Tobacco Company for a light dinner and drinks.

Friday, September 27th

A breakfast buffet started at 8:00 a.m. and everyone enjoyed time visiting with one another before having to board the charter bus for St. John's Church. The Charter Bus left at 9:15 for St. John's Church for the "Liberty or Death Tour," re-enactment and to see the burial place of William Claiborne (1748-1809). The actor was very well rehearsed and did a wonderful job explaining his role and answering questions about the time and the rationale for/against taxation and why the colonists struggled to decide whether to support Patrick Henry's cause.

I found this to be the most interesting part of the tour, as I did not stop to think that most of the planters at the time had been given their land by the King of England, so to support Patrick Henry meant to risk everything they had been given in the new land (if they were unsuccessful in their cause for freedom.)

We were within 5 (five) votes of voting to support liberty! He said if not for that we might be Canadians!! Ha! They never taught me that in high school or college history class even as late as the 1990's. There was discussion about the other settlement in Massachusetts and how things were going there as to the same concerns about taxes and representation.

The church is beautiful, but obviously has expanded over time, as it was originally a rectangular wooden box with simple pews, and then added onto over the centuries since 1741. There were lots of questions and he did a great job answering questions about the time period and the church building itself.

Because of the length of the new charter buses (Academy Charters), we were not able to go to Hollywood Cemetery. It was suggested that cousins attend that trip on their own should they wish to see the Claiborne plots.

The next stop was the Virginia Museum of History for a boxed lunch, a guided tour on the Story of Virginia and then a special rare book collection tour of Claiborne artifacts for our viewing by the Library Director, James Brookes, Ph.D.

Some of the special items we saw included:

- A Claiborne family genealogical chart, from an unknown compiler, ca. 1900. It contains our coat of arms and does seem to have earlier generations, including Thomas Claiborne with later generations including Herbert Augustine Claiborne.
- A manuscript family cookbook, ca. 1880, that belonged to Jane Charity Alston of Richmond, VA. Her daughter, Catherine Hamilton Cabell, married Herbert Augustine Claiborne, as his third wife.
- A letter from 1863 from Catharine Thom to Mary Anna (McGuire) Claiborne, regarding the destruction of buildings in Fredericksburg, VA caused by the recent civil war battle the past December.

The document that I spent the most time with that intrigued me the most was the diary of William Black of Stratford from 1744. This diary belonged to William Black of "Stratford", Westmoreland County, VA while he served as a secretary to a commission appointed to negotiate a treaty with the Six Nations. Dr. Brookes announced he would be very interested in learning what this diary was doing in a collection of Claiborne items, if any of us could tell him.

I did not know the answer until our past Vice President, Elizabeth Richardson, stated that the diary was in the Claiborne papers because Herbert Augustine Claiborne b. 1784 (6th generation from the first Wm. Claiborne) married Delia Hayes, who was a granddaughter of Wm. Black. It was probably donated by his grandson, Herbert Augustine Claiborne b. 1886 (my grandfather), as he donated all family papers he had inherited to the Virginia Historical Society.

The notation on the section of the diary I scanned with my phone references William Claiborne Sr. and Jr. were both aligned with Gov. Berkeley during Bacon's Rebellion. Another notation mentions Sr.'s age being too old to fight during this time, but that likely Jr. was the one involved and not Sr. It even includes a copy of Sr.'s signature during the time of his seventies. I shared a copy of this with Dr. King after her presentation, as I could not believe how everything tied together. She is planning a visit to look a little closer at this document.

Saturday, September 28th

While enjoying the breakfast buffet, final arrangements for carpooling to Sweet Hall were made for those opting in for the trip. Other options available were Bermuda Hundred, and Berkeley Plantation to name a couple.

For those heading to Sweet Hall, everyone paired off with their rides for the hour drive to the community of West Point.

The home was beautiful and the owner, Ms. Anastasiou, was very gracious. She introduced herself as a second generation American, coming from Richmond. I was so excited to finally be here. We had to all park on the gravel as there had been a lot of rain. She mowed the day before and cautioned us to watch for snakes. (Oh boy!) Since her mother lives with her and is in fragile health, we did not tour the inside of the home.

She talked about the work she had already done to restore original plaster that the former owner attempted to repair incorrectly, in addition to her goal to get all four fireplaces working. When viewing the main gravesites, she said she had cleaned up the vegetation and planned to place a dedication plaque. When I mentioned that the Society would be happy to contribute to such an endeavor, she said it would be her gift. She told us she considers herself a steward of the home, and I told her that we certainly appreciated the care she showed the home and property. We thanked her for her hospitality.

That evening, we gathered for the highlight of the reunion, our banquet. We gathered in the lobby outside the banquet room on the hotel stairs for a group photograph of Claiborne attendees. Cocktails were available for purchase in an adjoining room. The banquet started with prayer and announcements. Linda King took a few minutes to share her story of her discovery of her father's Clayborn identity. Our speaker was Dr. Julia King, Professor of Anthropology, St. Mary's College of Maryland. She gave a very interesting presentation on her grant and study of the time of Bacon's Rebellion, and how the lives of the indigenous people were affected. The area she was studying was Dragon Swamp, which also included land owned by William Claiborne Sr. called Bestland. Her theory is that William Sr. allowed the head of the Indigenous tribes to hide from Nathaniel Bacon to avoid capture in his land. Also, early 20th century accounts of the tribes' activities during this time, place the Natives at Bestland.

Sunday, September 29th

Sunday morning marked the end of another reunion, and goodbye until the next reunion. Many thanks are due to speaker Dr. Julia King, Ms. A. H. Anastasiou, and to Nicholas Cline for setting up our visit to Sweet Hall, Jennene Norman-Vacha for her production of our name tags, reunion materials and registration assistance, and Claiborne members Frank and Susan Rura, and Patricia Clayborn.



She has held fellowships with Harvard University's Dumbarton Oaks, the Virginia Historical Society, and Winterthur Museum and has received six major grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities. From 2003 until 2011, King served as an Expert Member on the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, a federal agency that advise the president and Congress on matters of national historic preservation policy. Her book, Archaeology, Narrative, and the Politics of the Past: The View from Southern Maryland, received a Book Award from the American Association of State and Local History in 2013. In 2018, the Society for Historical Archaeology presented King with the J.C. Harrington Award in recognition of her scholarly contributions to the discipline. King is one of the youngest members to have received the Harrington. She has also received awards from the Register for Professional Archaeologists and the Archaeological Society of Virginia. Her current research focus includes Indigenous history and colonialism in the Chesapeake region.

Officers Present – Linda M. King, Vice President, Frank Rura, Registrar, Charles Claiborne, Treasurer

Invocation & Opening Remarks:

Linda King welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order. Linda was pleased to see so many new faces, and new members and of course, to welcome those cousins returning for another reunion. President Deborah Peabody was unable to make it, and Secretary Nicholas Cline was also unable to attend, so Linda would be chairing the meeting and asking for volunteers to assist.

Charles Claiborne recognized Linda for her hard work on putting together an excellent reunion.

Linda asked for a volunteer to read the invocation: Berkeley Claiborne read the 1907 Claiborne Society Prayer.

Minutes from 2022 Reunion:



"CLAIBORNE CONNECTIONS HOW WE ARE RELATED"

Susan W.H. Rura November 4, 2024

Arrival. The Claiborne Society met for its biennial meeting, September 26-29, 2024 at the OMNI Hotel in Richmond, Virginia. As we arrived Thursday afternoon, the feeling was friendly, exciting, and then, was downright thrilling. There were new faces as well as familiar ones. But here were the Claibornes, the Cliborns, and even the Cleburnes, gathered together to help unravel their family history, many not knowing how they fit into the family puzzle.

The Family Groups. Who are we? The Claibornes' ancestry derives from Norfolk, England, from King's Lynn, on the East coast. The Cliborns claim old Henrico County, the county that surrounds Richmond, Virginia as their home place. The Cleburnes ancestry hearkens to an ancestral home in Cliburn, England, in the shire of Cumbria.

Recent History. Are we related? The recent history begins in 1988 when an invitation was issued to the Claibornes and relations to meet for a Reunion in Williamsburg. Each of us had been to England to either King's Lynn or to St. Cuthbert's Church in Cliburn and stated that we were related to William Claiborne, the surveyor of Jamestown. We all knew some of the story and part of the history of our family, so were conversant as we searched our family genealogy.

We had learned the history from two sources: the John Herbert Claiborne book, published 1917, and two Genealogy articles in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, printed July 1948 and October 1948. The John Herbert Claiborne book was titled WILLIAM CLAIBORNE OF VIRGINIA, with some account of his pedigree. The magazine articles by Clayton Torrence were "The English Ancestry of William Claiborne of Virginia", Part I (pp. 328--343) and Part II (pp. 431--460).

This bundle of information spurred our joint interest in genealogy, another reunion, and finding the connection of our family groups. This had been hypothesized for decades, the definitive clue that connects William Claiborne to the ancient family in Westmorland [now Cumbria shire] whose genealogy was collected during Heraldic Visitations under Henry VIII. Each speculation was always met with "will need proof" or a same-named person "was most probably" the connecting link.

New books. The Claiborne Society continued with 2 year reunions, searches, and discovered new books and documents. The book Cliborn--Claiborne RECORDS (1986, Nashville) was written by Lolita Bissell as she researched the Claiborne facts and sketched a Cliborn family tree from the early Colonial records of Henrico County, Virginia and also delineated numerous East Tennessee relations. Additionally an unexpected discovery was an old thick handwritten Journal found in a discarded piece of furniture, a secretary, in Georgia. This Journal was filled with numerous drawings, notations, prose paragraphs of many early Claiborne individuals. The transcription of its contents into a readable indexed book about Claibornes became a project of the Claiborne Society. [The Claiborne Family Journal, S. Forbes, E. Diamond, 2003]

What we learned from Bissell's book was the likelihood that we were unrelated family lines. And then, during the process of transcribing the Journal, we deduced who the author was. It was Dr. Christopher J. Cleborne, Rear Admiral USN, who lived 1838 to 1909, the earliest researcher of the Claiborne family history and tree.

DNA testing. We had accumulated extensive information about our families but still could not prove a connection. At the October business meeting of the 2001 Richmond Reunion, Dr. Alex A. Waldrop, III proposed we pursue DNA testing. He selected "FamilyTreeDNA" (Texas) because they use more markers, offer secure storage, and are genealogy specialists [Claiborne Clippings, Jan 2002].

We had traced significant genealogy for 3 surname family groups, the Claibornes, Cliborns, and Cleburnes, and another group, Clibborn, that came through Ireland. FamilyTreeDNA offered the Y-chromosome test which follows the heredity male line. We wanted 2 donors for each of the 4 family groups. Candidates were accepted and tested. And in time the surprising results were revealed.

Families 2, 3, 4, 8, 9 and 11 are close to the Atlantic Modal Haplotype. To determine if the 12-marker match between families 2 and 3 was indicative of relatedness or was a chance match, permission from two donors in family 3, from the family 2 donor and from one donor in family 4 was obtained and their tests were expanded to 25 markers. All 3 of these donors in families 2 and 3 matched at all 25 markers. As shown in the table, the family 4 donors differ from the family 2 motif at 4 sites in the 12-marker test; for the donor with the expanded test six additional mismatches were found for a total of 10 mismatches out of the 25 markers included in the tests.

1. and 7. William Claiborne Descendants

We currently have 3 donors participating in the study with a well-documented genealogy to William Claiborne who immigrated to Virginia in 1621. All three of these donors are descendants of Thomas Claiborne (1681-1732) of Sweet Hall, (grandson of William) and his wife Ann(e) Fox. The first two donors are descendants of his son, Augustine (1721-1787). The third donor is a descendant of his son, Nathaniel (c.1716-1756). All three of these donors match at all 12 markers. The donor listed as being in family 7 in the table is a known descendant of Richard Claiborne (1755-1819) and his first wife, Ann Cole. Before this study Richard was thought to be a descendant of William Claiborne, but his ancestry has not yet been established by regular genealogy because of the loss of records in many Virginia counties. This donor matches the 3 proved descendants of William at 11 of 12 markers. The William Claiborne motif is a very rare motif. Therefore it is not likely that this close match is a coincidence. In other words, there is now strong evidence that Richard Claiborne and his descendants of William Claiborne.

2. Cliburn Hall Descendants

We have one donor with a proved genealogy connecting to the manor at Cliburn Hall near Penrith in Cumbria, England. He is a descendant of Dr. Christopher James Cleborne, Rear Admiral, USN (1838-1909). Dr. Cleborne's ggggggrandfather was Thomas Cleborne (1580-1640) of Cliburn Hall. Thomas's wife was Frances Lowther. The DNA results show that Family 3 is related to this family by direct male descent.

3. John Cliborn/Clyborn Descendants

We have four donors with a proved genealogy to John Cliborn (c. 1712-1766) whose wife was Jane/Jean (not Robertson); this John Cliborn is often referred to as John of Dale Parish or John of Old Henrico. One donor is a descendant of John's elder son, Jonas (c. 1733- c. 1795) whose wife was Edith Folkes. Three of the donors are descendants of this John's son John (1735-1782) who married Elizabeth Robertson,


ANNUAL DUES
